# $oldsymbol{T_o}$ All In Our Learning Community,

Through this Easter Season as a Catholic dialogue school we have been reflecting on the symbols associated with this season. Our prayer space reflects this focus.

Last week we considered the symbol of water. This week let's think about the symbol of light. During the Easter Mass the Easter or Paschal candle is lit from a fire. As the candle is lit the words **Christ our light** are proclaimed. For Christians light removes darkness, the darkness of death overcome by Christ, the light of the world. At the baptism of Christians they are entrusted with the light of Christ to be keep burning within their hearts. The candle in our prayer space represents Christ our light and the presence of God within our learning community.

Light and fire are also a powerful symbol for other cultures and religious traditions.

The oldest peoples' in this land, our indigenous brothers and sisters believe fire means, and is significant because, it is the calling of people together, the gathering in a circle around the fire for cooking and eating and for warmth at night; the gathering for ceremonies; the gathering for story telling; the place for being together. Fire is at the heart of Indigenous culture.

Light has special significance for Hindus especially during the time of Diwali or Festival of lights when light triumphs over darkness. Light signifies respect and a sign of change in the Buddhist tradition.

Through our dialogue with the religious traditions presence in our Catholic dialogue school we are provided with the opportunity to consider our current thinking about light and to gain new layers of meaning. New layers of meaning are possible when we are open to the thinking of others which can both challenged or affirmed our thinking?

This week families are invited to consider the significance of light within their religious tradition. What does light mean? How is it visually represented in your religious tradition?

## What's Happening in the Learning Spaces

"Parents should be educated in the language of schooling, so that the home and school can share the expectations, and the child does not have to live in two worlds – with little understanding between the home and the school". John Hattie, 2009

### Foundation – Year 2 Learning Spaces

"When students feel that they are the ones "doing the learning" rather than the teacher they are undoubtedly more engaged, and with engagement comes increased potential for learning." (Kath Murdoch, 2007)

As hermeneutical learners we will reflect on our dialogue using the prompt, *Engaging with the mystery of God*. We will theorise what we think this means using the thinking moves identifying new ideas and wondering, using the thinking routine, **Think-Puzzle-Explore**. We will share our **first thinking** by documenting in small groups our ideas in words and pictures. We will share with each other our **wonderings** by asking, 'What puzzles us about the mystery of God?' We will explore our thinking further by looking closely at images that invite us to **extend our thinking**. We will **make our thinking visible** by finishing the sentence, '**The mystery of God is...**'

Over the next few days, we will begin finding out about our inquiry around our compelling question, 'What is it made of and how did it get here?' As researchers, we will find out about the different types of material through a literacy lens. We will read a variety of literacy texts to identify and build on our vocabulary to describe and explain the properties of materials. We will explore the meaning of these words using text features like glossaries and dictionaries. We will also develop word webs to help us break down the word, identify prefixes and suffixes and understand the meaning of the word. As mathematicians, we have engaged in assessments to tune in and activate our prior knowledge around Statistics and Probability. As researchers, we will develop the skills of collecting and classifying data and creating displays of data using lists and graphs. As thinkers, we will make connections to our inquiry as we consider how we might sort our discoveries about different materials onto data charts.

## **Bridging Centre**

## Year 3 – 4 Learning Spaces

For our **Faith** and **Life inquiry question**, **'How and Why do we Design?'** we continued the process of **tuning in**. As **researchers** and **thinkers**, we had **time** and **opportunity** to view a clip about the **iterative process** of **designing** a 3D printed frog home mounted on a fence. Through this we **identified** 

the initial cause for **generating** a design and the **process** of making **modifications** based on **feedback**. As **self-managers**, we were **resilient** and **reflective** as we made wise **decisions** about our learning. As **thinkers**, we made **connections** between our **thinking** and new ideas. As we **reflected** on this clip, we **considered** - Why is it designed this way? What do we think the designers had in mind when designing this frog home? Why and how did the designer make changes to their design?

To develop our **schema** around the **key understanding** of how **forces** can **impact** a **design**, we began to unpack our current **knowledge** about **forces** in the world. As **collaborators** we created a mind map about forces, **respectfully listening** to the ideas of others and **contributing** our thinking to the group. Further we **engaged** in **research** around the six types of simple **machines** and the **implementation** into a range of objects in our learning space. Being **thinkers**, we **documented** our initial thinking, around what a machine is, then **carefully observed** a video about simple machines, with common examples. After viewing and making **connections** to ourselves and the world we document our new **understanding** around what constitutes a machine.

As members of a **Faith based community** we began to tune into the **Sacrament of Eucharist** in connection to the whole school **Scripture**, **The Walk to Emmaus** (**Luke 24: 13-35**). We **engaged** in the thinking moves **describing** and **interpreting** using the thinking routine **See, Think, Wonder** routine using two Seiger Koder images, one **depicting** the **Last Supper**, the other, the meal Jesus shared with his **disciples** in the **Walk to Emmaus**. After **documenting** our **thinking** we **reflected** deeply by **comparing** and **contrasting** the two images, **considering** what was the **same** and **different** and wondered why the artist made their choices for each image. We will continue to find out about **Eucharist** in **preparation** for many students forthcoming **celebration** of the **Sacrament** for their first time.

# Leadership Centre

Year 5/6 Learning Spaces

Teachers with an inquiry mindset generally see learning as a two-way process and view students as capable and curious. The expectation that accompanies this is that students can actively investigate questions, problems and challenges - coming to both expected and unexpected conclusions.

As curious and reflective thinkers, as part of our Faith and Life inquiry, we are exploring some commentaries related to, On the Road to Emmaus, Luke 24:13-35 to provide an opportunity for us to find out and develop deeper understanding and insight. As critical and reflective thinkers we will engage in the thinking moves making connections and identifying new ideas. We will be learning hermeneutically as we engage in the continuous process of seeing new layers of meaning and having an openness to change and reinterpretation. Through our reading of this text we will consider what this text might tell us from a future orientated perspective. What does this text reveal to us? What is our new reading of this text? What does this text talk to us about the world? We will be invited to



document our thinking - This text talks to me of a world in which ... As part of our Faith and Life inquiry, as curious and critical thinkers, we will be invited to further explore the 10 characteristics of prayer that are suggested to reflect a Catholic Dialogue school. In particular we will focus on Characteristic 4: The principle of hospitality. We will have time and opportunity to reflect and consider our perspective and current understanding at this moment in time.



As part of our Faith and Life inquiry understanding **Businesses target identified needs and wants in designing and producing goods and services**, as part of the **finding out** phase of inquiry, we are **engaging** in an **interactive and hands on learning opportunity** with **Talk Money.** During this workshop, we will **learn how to save, manage, and spend money, manage needs versus wants** and **discuss the** 

**digitisation of money and different payment options**. Through a series of activities, we will explore how people value money differently and how we can have constructive conversations with family and friends about money. **As mathematical thinkers**, as part of the Victorian Curriculum, **Money and** 

**Financial maths**, this workshop will also provide us with an opportunity to learn how to set savings goals as part of managing our money.

As curious and flexible mathematical thinkers some of us are engaging in learning opportunities related to fractions including naming and identifying fractional parts, investigating strategies to solve problems involving addition and subtraction of fractions with the same denominator, comparing fractions with related denominators and locating and representing them on a number line, solving problems involving addition and subtraction of fractions with related denominators and finding a simple fraction of a quantity where the result is a whole number. As mathematical thinkers, at home, we are able to access the educational websites Toy Theatre <a href="https://toytheater.com/fraction-strips/">https://toytheater.com/fraction-strips/</a> and Nrich <a href="https://nrich.maths.org/1103">https://nrich.maths.org/1103</a> to assist us to consolidate our mathematical understandings related to fractions.

As part of **Home Learning** it is **expected** that your **child engages in reading** and that the **Reading Journal is signed**.
