The current conflict in Gaza has been a catalyst to unrest across the globe. A deep seated dispute and hostility has again erupted. Sadly for many in our learning community the horrors of war are not unfamiliar.

Last week we considered the Catholic Dialogue School and the role and place of dialogue. The work of moral theologian Roger Burggraeve was considered. Burggraeve tells us dialogue requires a way of thinking or being. It recognises that as human persons we are connected to each other. Entering into dialogue is not possible without the other-face to face. Burggraeve proposes, 'You have never a face just on your own, by your own. You only have a face when you are in relationship with the other.' Dialogue requires a respect and acknowledgement of the other as made in the image and likeness of God. What might this mean for our own views of this current conflict? How is this discussed or made sense of in your life? How are children shielded yet made aware of these hostilities? The current conflict has been the source of discussion in my own family. How do we make sense of this? How is it possible that such evils can occur? How do we navigate or make sense of this as Christians?

I share with you, with her permission, one of my daughter's reflections, struggles and prayer as a believer, a woman and mother...

Away with War. Away with Politics. Away with anyone who thinks it's OK to kill another human. Away with the heartless. Away with hate crime. Away with world leader's agendas and their conspirators.

I pray for all the new heavenly babies. I pray that their souls rest in eternal peace and love, and that their eternal lives with God are blessed with all the beauty the world could not afford them on Earth, that they live on eternally seeing no evil and only the grace and love of God.

I pray for all the mother and fathers, who have lost their children and their families, and bared witness to the cruel acts of evil and war. May they find peace and may God grant them comfort and abundant healing.

I pray for young people who held aspirations and future dreams, for those who worked hard to build a better tomorrow.

I pray for the young children whose childhood was robbed and whose innocent eye witnessed things no child should ever hear about. I pray that their trauma be healed and that the living can find peace in their life in spite of the terror they have faced.

I pray for those of us on Earth with open hearts who are holding space for the cruelty unfairly thrown at our brothers and sisters on Earth. May we hold on to our faith despite the evil that exists in the world. May we remember that humanity is stronger than evil.

The Catholic Dialogue School must continue to promote and embrace the richness of diversity, the human struggle for meaning and the Catholic belief that all people are created by God. This is not easy in the face of evil and those who choose to inflict pain on others. Our focus on learning hermeneutically supported by hermeneutical prompts continue to enable reflection and sense making as we 'continuously search, question, inquire, imagine and re-imagine', having an 'openness to and learning from other religions, cultures and ways of life', enabling learners to consider multiple views. What are your reflections, struggles and prayers?

What's Happening in the Learning Spaces

"Parents should be educated in the language of schooling, so that the home and school can share the expectations, and the child does not have to live in two worlds – with little understanding between the home and the school". John Hattie, 2009

Foundation – Year 2 Learning Spaces

"Learning is meaningful when we understand the way it can make a difference to our lives or the lives of others. Journeys of inquiry can be made more meaningful when they are situated in real contexts, issues and problems, where actions can be taken as a result of the insights gained through exploration." (Kath Murdoch, 2023)

As part of **Faith and Life inquiry**, some of us have had **time and opportunity** to pause and reflect on the understandings, 'Living things have a variety of external features and live in different places where their basic needs are met,' and 'The features of a place can help determine what lives there.' As **researchers** and **thinkers** we **reflected** on our **shared experience** of the **Great Aussie Bird Count** using the thinking routine Connect-Extend-Challenge to **identify** and **extend** our thinking, as well as raising any **new wonderings** we have. We will view the **results** of the bird count and discover that our **observations** helped to count **3 677 997** birds around Australia. Some of our thinking and **theories** we have developed from our observations of birds are;

The birds we saw liked the trees and grass because they could get nectar and bugs to eat. (Alex) I think the birds were there because their habitats were there. Habitats are a home for birds. (Saanvi) Red wattle birds like the hot weather. We saw more when it was hot than when it was windy (Jacob) The honey-eater liked the trees that could hide them. It made them hard to see. (Olivia F) They hide from predators such as cats. (Charbel and Eva)

Through the **lens of a scientist**, this week we are preparing to use the skills of **researchers** as we engage in the **shared experience** of observing animals at Melbourne Zoo. We will have time and opportunity to find out and sort out our thinking about our compelling question, **'What lives here?'** through the workshop *Wild Lab* or *Wild Explorer*.

As mathematical thinkers some of us are tuning in to the concept of location and to our excursion to the zoo. We will look closely and observe the map of Melbourne Zoo. We will identify the map's features and interpret the symbols and label them. As thinkers we will identify which animals we think we should visit at the zoo. As mathematicians will look at the times of the zoo keeper talks to make a timetable of our day. We will need to think about the time we get to the zoo and the time we leave to make our timetable. We will justify our choices of what animal trails to see by building explanations about which trail will help us find out about our compelling question, 'What lives here?'

As part of Faith and Life inquiry, we are **tuning in** and **finding out** about **Catholic Missions Australia** and the Catholic social teaching of **Solidarity.** We will use the thinking routine **Connect-Extend-Challenge** to **make connections** to what we might already know about **reaching out to others** in the world, even though we might never meet them. We will **read about Elena from Timor-Leste** and find out about what it is like for her to go to school by **viewing** a 360 video of her classroom. We will extend our thinking by adding any new ideas to our thinking. We will then identify any new challenges we might have. Some of us are curious about sockballs and will be finding out about how to make one. We will also **reflect critically** as **hermeneutical learners** about why we might wear crazy socks on Friday 27^{th} October and **make connections** with what we **find out** about **Solidarity.**






As curious inquirers, we continue to enjoy, engage with, and observe our baby chicks delivered to us a week ago. Since they arrived two more chicks have hatched, and we are in the process of gathering information from close observations as we watch more eggs begin to hatch. "Our curiosity is not simply sparked by what we see and hear but what we feel, smell and taste." (Kath Murdoch, 2015) Throughout the day, we have had time and opportunity to sit in the space and observe the chicks in the brooder

box and **notice closely** what is **happening** in the **incubator**. As **thinkers** and **researchers**, we are **developing** and

refining questions to help us seek and gather information and being flexible and considering how our thinking is changing. Through personal inquiries, we are investigating our own wonderings based on our observations.





In the coming week, we will have **time** and **opportunity** as part of **exploring** our **compelling question** 'How do living things grow and change?' to visit La Trobe Wildlife Sanctuary in Bundoora. As part of **tuning in** to this **shared learning opportunity** and as part of **tuning in** to **location** as part of **mathematical thinking**; we will **look closely** at a **map, make notes** about the **features** of the **map** and

identify the best way to **travel** there.



This week we had the opportunity to **engage** with **author** and **illustrator Adam Wallace.** He **shared** with us another **perspective** on **developing stories**, and we **enjoyed** using **rhyming** to help **draw step** by **step illustrations**. As a **gift** from him, we each **received** a **book** written by him. As **mathematicians**, we are **tuning in** to **location** by **creating** and **interpreting simple grid maps** and **showing positions** and **pathways**. As **thinkers**, we will **develop** the **skill** of using **simple scales**, **legends**, and **directions** to **interpret information** contained on **basic maps**.

Leadership Centre Year 5-6 Learning Spaces

If we identify, communicate, and scaffold the thinking needed in every task to support students' development as effective thinkers, *then* student understanding will deepen, and students will focus primarily on the learning over the mere completion of work.

As part of tuning in to the Catholic Social Teaching principle - Solidarity, as reflective thinkers, we will document our first thinking about the word, 'solidarity.' As part of finding out we will engage in the thinking moves connection making and identifying new ideas as we view images and a film clip about Solidarity from Catholic Social Teaching. As part of tuning in to Catholic Mission Month, we will engage in the thinking moves, making connections, identifying new ideas and wondering, through the thinking routine Connect-Extend-Challenge, as we view the Global video – We are Still Here and the film clip, Discover Timor-Leste and Make an Impact Today. This coming Friday, as part of taking action, we are invited to engage in Crazy Sock Day, as one way of showing our 'solidarity.' We will be learning hermeneutically as we engage in this continuous process of seeing new layers of meaning, having an openness to change and reinterpretation and dialoguing with each other. We will have an opportunity to document the changes in our thinking through *This text talks to me of a world in which*

As reflective and critical thinkers we are using our comprehension strategies to assist us to analyse and synthesize information and link ideas from various print and digital sources about structural features, behavioural adaptations and enrichment of animals including our documentation in our journals from our excursions. As part of sorting out our thinking, as writers, we are using photos and labelled diagrams as 'seeds', as part of our Writer's Notebook. As creative writers we are engaging in the thinking moves activating prior knowledge, making connections and identifying new ideas as we craft information texts.

As mathematical thinkers and inquirers, as part of sorting out our thinking, we are utilising a variety of digital programs including Rainforest Maths and Toy Theatre as we engage in some learning opportunities related to Measurement and Geometry. In particular we are engaging in tasks to help us explore and inquire into 3D shapes, their nets, construction of prisms and pyramids and the transformations of 2D shapes.
