ANZAC DAY

This year, Mother Teresa Primary School has been invited to participate in the ANZAC Day Service at Craigieburn ANZAC Park, There are two services:

- 5.45 am for a 6.00 am start (Dawn Service)
- 9.45 am for a 10.00 am start (Morning Service Wreath laying for schools at this time)

Some staff will be attending the 10am service, and students and their families are warmly invited to also attend. Two students have been selected to lay down a wreath on behalf of Mother Teresa Primary School at the 10 am service. If you are able to attend either service, here are the following key details:

Venue: Craigieburn ANZAC Park, corner of Windrock Avenue and Marathon Boulevard, Craigieburn **Time:** April 25, commencing at **6am sharp** and **10am sharp** respectively.

For the 10am service, some Mother Teresa staff will be in attendance with 2 students who will lay down a wreath on behalf of our school community.

Uniform: Wearing of the school uniform is encouraged to the 10am service.

Seating and shelter: Some seating and shelter will be available in the event of inclement weather, although this may be limited, as large numbers attend.

Towards the end of the newsletter, we have included the official flyer for ANZAC day services in Craigieburn.



Learning and Teaching News

Helping Children Learn: Understanding Cognitive Load Theory

This week in our staff meetings, the staff have been learning more about Sweller's Cognitive Load Theory. This theory helps us understand how children learn best. It explains that our brain has a limited capacity for processing new information, and how we present learning can make a big difference.



Two Types of Learning Load

Intrinsic Load: This is the natural difficulty of a subject. Some topics, like solving math problems or learning a new language are more complex. Teachers can help by breaking learning into smaller steps and providing support. We want to **manage** this load.

Extraneous Load: This is extra, unnecessary difficulty caused by unclear instructions or too much information at once. Reducing distractions, using clear visuals, and giving step-by-step guidance

can make learning easier for children. We want to **minimise** this load.

Supporting Learners: Children learn in different ways depending on their experience:

- Novice Learners (Beginners): These children need more structure, clear explanations, and examples to follow.
- **Expert Learners (Advanced)**: These children already know the basics and benefit from exploring topics in greater depth and solving problems independently.

Sometimes we are a novice learner and sometimes we are an expert learner depending on what is being taught.

How This Helps Your Child: By understanding cognitive load, we can create learning experiences that support your child's needs. Whether they are just starting out or already confident in a subject, ensuring they are not overwhelmed helps them stay engaged and succeed.

Together, we can make learning a positive and rewarding experience for every child!

Luke 15:1-3 11-32

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Your brother here was dead and has come to life

The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. 'This man,' they said, 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me." So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery.

When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch, so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against


heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve



to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing. Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But for this son of yours, when he comes



back after swallowing up your property – he and his women – you kill the calf we had been fattening."

The father said, "My son, you are with me always and all I have is yours. But it is only right we should celebrate and rejoice, because your brother here was dead and has come to life; he was lost and is found."

ANZAC Day Commemorative Services (Dawn and Morning) will be held at the Craigieburn War Memorial, located in the North-East Quadrant of ANZAC Park – near the corner of Windrock Avenue and Marathon Boulevard, Craigieburn (Melway: Map 386 Grid G6)

The services will provide the opportunity for the local community to remember those Australian men and women who served their country during times of conflict and to especially honour those who made the supreme sacrifice.

The ceremonies will be conducted by RSL Sub-Branch member(s) and will be hosted by the Craigieburn War Memorial and Remembrance Committee (CWMRC) – which holds official Friends of the RSL status. Attendees are encouraged to bring a small floral tribute (twig of wattle, rosemary or other flower) in memory of a relative, friend or other loved one, for placement at the memorial during the service.

WEARING OF MEDALS

Recipients of medals and awards are encouraged to wear the full size versions in accordance with the protocols of the Australian Honours and Awards system. Family members are also encouraged to wear the medals of passed love ones – these are worn on the Right Hand side.
